CELEBRATION OF HARMONY: ONAM & MILAD-UN-NABISPECIAL ASSEMBLY



REPORT ON QUARTERLY EXAMINATION TERM I (CLASSES I TO X & XII)

The Quarterly Examination – Term I for the academic year 2025–26 was conducted systematically and successfully across all classes with the joint efforts of the teaching and non-teaching staff. The examinations for Classes X & XII commenced on 10.09.2025 and concluded on 29.09.2025, while the examinations for Classes I to IX were held from 15.09.2025 to 26.09.2025.



Intensive revision sessions were meticulously planned and executed by the subject teachers, ensuring that all portions were thoroughly covered. Model question papers and revision tests were conducted in higher classes to help students gain confidence and improve their performance. The Exam Committee members worked in close coordination with all administrators for seating arrangements, and question paper distribution. Invigilation responsibilities were distributed equally and fairly among staff members. PT staff functioned as the examination squad, making frequent rounds to maintain discipline and prevent malpractice. Paper corrections have already commenced immediately after the completion of each subject to ensure timely remarks.

Marks consolidation is in progress for prompt reporting to School Principal. Corrected answer scripts will be distributed to students on the school reopening day (03.10.2025). Administrators regularly inspected exam halls, reinforcing discipline and smooth conduct of the schedule. Students displayed excellent attendance and discipline, reflecting their commitment to their exams.

A POCSO awareness Meeting was conducted on 06.09.2025 (Saturday) at the Government Medical College and Hospital, Krishnagiri, under the leadership of the Honourable Education Minister, the District Collector, and a team of eminent resource persons. The meeting was convened to create awareness and strengthen the safety measures for children in all schools and educational institutions. The meeting was attended by school correspondents, nodal staff, transport department officials, campus supervisors, and other main representatives from various educational institutions across the district.

The primary objective of the session was to sensitize school managements and staff on the provisions of the POCSO Act, to ensure the safety, protection, and well-being of children within and outside the school campus. All schools must strictly follow the guidelines of the POCSO Act to safeguard children from any form of sexual abuse or exploitation. Every school must form a POCSO committee comprising the Principal, teachers, counselors, and parent representatives to handle complaints and grievances confidentially.

Regular awareness sessions and counseling for students, teachers, and non-teaching staff were emphasized to educate them about safe practices and the importance of reporting any suspicious behavior. Schools must ensure the installation of CCTV cameras, proper lighting, and secure entry and exit points to prevent unauthorized access. Transport staff, including drivers and attendants, must undergo background verification, maintain clean records, and be trained on child safety protocols. Any incident or suspicion must be reported immediately to the Principal, Child Welfare Committee and the authorities without delay.

Campus supervisors are required to maintain strict vigilance during school hours, especially in secluded areas, playgrounds, and transport pick-up/drop points.

The meeting served as a valuable platform to reinforce the collective responsibility of schools in ensuring a safe and secure environment for all students. The Education Minister and District Collector urged all correspondents and nodal officers to implement the discussed measures without fail and to conduct regular reviews and training programs to prevent any violation of the POCSO guidelines.

The session concluded with a pledge by all attendees to work with commitment, vigilance, and accountability to uphold the rights and safety of every child.

REPORT ON TEACHERS' DAY CELEBRATION GENTS STAFF CRICKET TOURNAMENT
